

Through gentle body meditation, dreamwork, and active imagination, we will find the unique personal symbols and archetypal patterns at the heart of our existence. Class time will include discussion, writing, and optional sharing of work.

#### Location & Accommodation



Early October is an ideal time for writers to visit Paris. The summer crowds are gone and the weather is cooler. Whether you are a first time visitor or an accomplished "flaneuse," Paris offers numerous cafes and restaurants; museums, galleries, and parks in which to find inspiration for your inner and outer wanderings. The workshop will take place at 4 rue Chapon, 75003.

If you would like to be within walking distance from the workshop site, seek accommodation in the 3rd or 4th arrondissements (the district known as The Marais, or in the district known as Beaubourg/ Les Halles).

You may wish to check out Vacations Rentals by Owner. and Airbnb. Apartments generally offer more comfort and better value than a hotel. VRBO and Airbnb can be searched by arrondissement. The owners depend on good reviews and often take a personal interest in helping their guests. Sharing is a good option to reduce overall costs.

If you would prefer a hotel try Google (Paris hotels 3rd arrondissement or Paris Hotels in the Marais district), which offers plenty of choice in terms of the location, price, and amenities that you are looking for.

Participants should plan to arrive in Paris by September 30th. There will be an informal welcome dinner on Sunday, October 1st. The workshop will begin on Monday at 9:30 am. A detailed schedule of the week will be sent to registrants.

## Historical Notes on the Workshop Site

The venue for the workshop is the Hôtel Claude Passart complex (aka Hôtel Jean Bart, a registered historical building) at 4 rue Chapon. The workshop will take place in the most recent addition to the complex, built in 1840, and overlooking the private courtyard and 17th C. façade of one of the first great houses built in the district known as the Marais. This hôtel particulier (private mansion) was built in 1618-1620 for the wealthy banker Claude Passart by Gabriel Soulignac, a celebrated architect of the period; it has housed many notable historical figures including, during the reign of Louis XVI, the inspector of the King's artillery. Today the hôtel is the home and European headquarters of Juan Pablo Molyneaux, an internationally celebrated designer, who rescued the historic building from dereliction with a major renovation in the early 1990s.


When rue Chapon was established in 1193, it lay just outside the city walls. The street has had a colourful history of saints and sinners: in the 13th C. it was a Jewish neighbourhood with a synagogue, and the name Chapon is said to have come from 'capon', the capes worn by rabbis. During 1256-1760, rue Chapon was one of the three areas of Paris where prostitution was tolerated (hence the street's nickname at the time - rue de Coq). In 1389, it was home to the Bishop of Chalons, who is rumoured to have rented rooms to prostitutes. Later, rue Chapon was the home of Madame de Mandeville, a celebrated 16th C. courtesan.

Rue Chapon was also the location for one of the oldest convents of Carmelite nuns. The convent was established in 1617 and dissolved after 1789, when the anti-clerical sentiment of the French revolutionaries resulted in the extinction of the Carmelite Order in France, and the martyrdom of members of the Carmelite family.

In 1831, rue Chapon was the location of a famous massacre; 14 people were killed in the revolt against Louis-Philippe I. Daumier's masterpiece, Massacre at rue Transnonain was inspired by this event, as was Delacroix's renowned work, Liberty Leading the People.

Over the years, businesses on rue Chapon have included a famous theatre, the Doyan; and a shop manufacturing some of the first and finest camera lenses, where the pioneer documentary photographer, Eugène Atget, purchased his equipment. During the Second World War, a print shop serviced the French Resistance; and in 1944, the Resistance leader, Colonel Tanguy met with Paris police to plot the uprising against German occupying forces.

Today rue Chapon forms part of the Marais, one of the city's most trendy neighbourhoods, full of interesting shops, restaurants and galleries, home to a thriving gay community, and a center for the wholesale trade in leather goods and costume jewelry. Within a ten-minute walk from the workshop site are Paris City Hall (Hôtel de Ville), the Pompidou Centre (modern art); the Picasso Museum, Place des Vosges, an architectural gem; Place de la Republique, the gathering place for commemorating the victims of the terrorist attacks; the Jewish neighbourhood, featuring kosher foods and restaurants; the Carnavalet Museum (history of Paris), and BHV, one of the great Paris department stores. Also nearby, is the rue de Bretagne, featuring many restaurants and food shops, including a covered food market, the Marché des Enfants Rouges, a favourite destination for fish, organic produce, fresh flowers. and tasty Moroccan food.
